Debbie Bacigalupi BIO

Deborah “Debbie” Bacigalupi is a sixth-generation California rancher, public speaker, avid researcher, and a decades' long activist for Siskiyou County and rural America.

Debbie serves as Vice President of Education for American Agri-Women, Vice President of the Siskiyou County chapter of Back Country Horsemen, and serves on the Little Shasta Elementary School Board. In these roles, she supports and defends agricultural education, rural traditions, youth development, animal ownership and the great outdoors.

In 2012, Bacigalupi ran for the U.S. House of Representatives in the SF Bay Area, campaigning on issues important to rural Northern California including private property rights, support for family agriculture, and exposing international agendas eroding freedom and liberty.

For more than 16 years, Debbie has researched and spoken about global environmental governance and the policies associated with UN Agenda 21 Sustainable Development (aka “sustainability”) and related initiatives like the 30x30, “Nature Based Solutions,” “Rights of Nature,” “Stolen Land Movement,” Cap-n-Trade, the Endangered Species Act and so much more. She maintains these ideologies threaten private property rights, local control of land and resources, the future of rural communities, and freedom and liberty.

As part of that work, Debbie has attended more than a dozen United Nations conferences around the world, including major international climate meetings in order to witness, protest, and report on these schemes firsthand. On many occasions, she has confronted famous politicians who authored bills on these matters (for example, 1992's H. Con.Res353) calling them out for their anti-freedom and anti-liberty slant.

Debbie has been featured in several documentaries addressing the above agendas as well as co-created four documentaries examining wolves, Klamath River dam destruction, water policy, radical environmentalism, etc. and their impact on rural communities, land management, and agriculture. She has been an invited speaker, keynote speaker, panelist, radio and podcast guest to nearly 100 different events as well as featured in many newspaper articles over the years.

With her parents she manages the family cattle ranch in Montague, where they are a cow-calf operation and also raise a limited number of high-quality ranch-to-fork grass-fed cattle with USDA steaks, ground beef, roasts etc. for sale locally.

Debbie holds a Master of Business Administration (MBA) and is a Certified Corporate Event Professional as well as a certified sommelier, bringing a diverse professional background in business, hospitality, and event production to her advocacy and public speaking.



DID YOU KNOW. . . .

For many of the 30+ million Americans of Irish decent living in the United States, this is a massive secular holiday originating in a time of historical discrimination. The first recorded Saint Patrick's Day parade took place in St. Augustine, Florida on March 17, 1601, by the Spanish Colony's Irish Vicar Richardo Artur. The first observance in the Thirteen Colonies was in 1737, and the first large-scale parade was organized by Irish soldiers in New York in 1762.

In the 19th Century Irish Immigrants faced intense hostility, so by holding public parades, it became a way to show strength in numbers and demand political respect. Also, during this period, the phrase "luck of the Irish" originated in the U.S gold and silver rush. It was coined as a, often, derogatory phrase to imply that the Irish-born miners, only through luck rather than skill and hard work, were successful. In the late 19th Century sentiment changed toward the Irish Americans as it became clear that the British Monarchy greed and indifference was to blame for the famine in Ireland causing the migration of the lower-class Irish Protestant to America.

In every year since 1991, March has been proclaimed Irish American Heritage Month by the U.S. Congress or President. From religious roots to global holiday, celebrations are enjoyed in most every city and town in America. Most of the St. Patrick's Day traditions were³ born in America.

Wearing Green: People wear green clothing and accessories to show spirit and avoid being "pinched" by leprechauns, a playful American folklore tradition.

Massive Parades: The U.S. hosts some of the world's largest parades. The first dating back to 1762, is the oldest and largest, featuring over 150,000 marchers. Other major parades occur in Boston, Chicago, and Savannah.

Dyeing Waterways Green: Chicago famously dyes the Chicago River a vibrant emerald green using a vegetable-based dye. Similarly, the White House fountains and city fountains in Savannah are often dyed green.

Corned Beef and Cabbage: While not a native Irish dish, this became a staple for Irish immigrants in the 19th century as a cheaper substitute for bacon and is now the "official" meal of the holiday in the U.S..

Green Beer and Spirits: Many American bars serve green-tinted beer. Consumption of Guinness and Irish whiskey is also customary.

Family Activities: Children often participate by making leprechaun traps looking for four-leaf clovers, or eating green-colored treats like Shamrock Shakes.

Note: Remember St. Patrick's Day should never be called St. Patty's Day. It is gender specific. ST. PADDY'S DAY. Enjoy the 4 green beer!

Serves as Acting Governor whenever the Governor is absent from the state

Automatically becomes Governor if a vacancy occurs in the Office of the Governor.

President of the Senate and votes in case of a tie.

Serves as a voting member of the Board of Regents of the University of California, Board of Trustees of the California State University system, and the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges system. Sits on the Calbright College Board of Trustees.

Rotates with the State Controller, as chair of the State Lands Commission. Serves on the Ocean Protection Council During alternate years

Non-voting member of the Coastal Commission.

Chairs the California Commission for Economic Development.

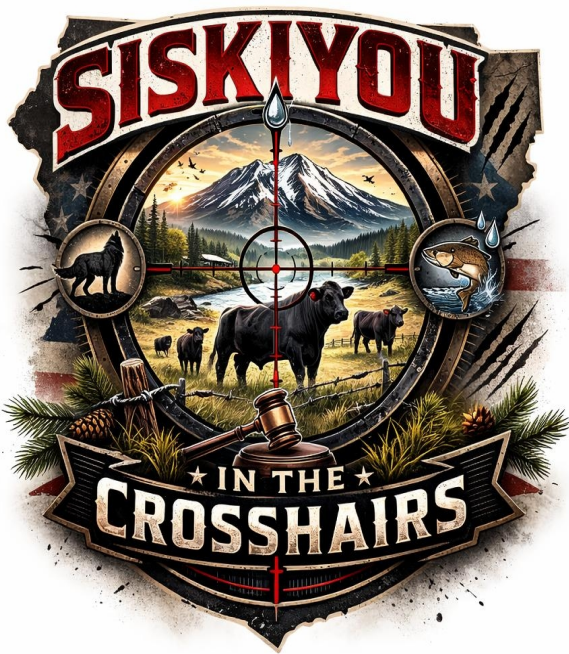

First the Wolves Now the Grizzlies

California Senate Bill 1305 (SB 1305) from the 2025–2026 Regular Session:

Title: Wildlife: bears. This act shall be known as the “California Grizzly Restoration Act.”

The bill proposes that the California Department of Fish and Wildlife prepare and publish a detailed roadmap for the potential reintroduction of grizzly bears in California.

- *The roadmap must include a scientific assessment using the best available data, consultation with California Native American tribes, and community engagement.
- *The bill also prohibits actual reintroduction of grizzly bears until further scientific and community-based conditions are met.
- *It sets a deadline (by June 30, 2028) for submitting the roadmap to the Legislature and relevant agencies.

SB 1305 was introduced by Senator Laura Richardson (D) on February 20, 2026, with It has been printed and was referred for committee assignment, but has not yet passed any committees or votes in either chamber.

AB 1900 CalCare: Coverage for “All Residents” and Proposed Tax Structure

California’s renewed effort to establish a single-payer health care system, most recently through **California Assembly Bill 1900**, builds on earlier proposals such as **California Assembly Bill 1400** and **California Assembly Bill 2200**, authored by Assemblymember Ash Kalra.

These bills proposed creating a state-administered health care program covering **all California residents, regardless of income, employment status, or immigration status — including undocumented individuals.** The legislation eliminates premiums, deductibles, and co-payments and **replaces** most private health insurance coverage with a publicly financed system.

Earlier funding proposals envisioned a combination of new taxes, including:

- A 2.3% gross receipts tax on businesses with more than \$2 million in annual revenue
- A 1.25% employer payroll tax
- A 1% employee payroll tax on wages above approximately \$50,000
- Progressive income surtaxes on higher earners

Independent fiscal analyses of prior versions estimated total annual program costs could **exceed \$400 billion**, making the proposal one of the largest public financing expansions in state history. While AB 1900 reintroduces the policy framework for universal coverage, it does not yet specify the final tax mechanism required for implementation.

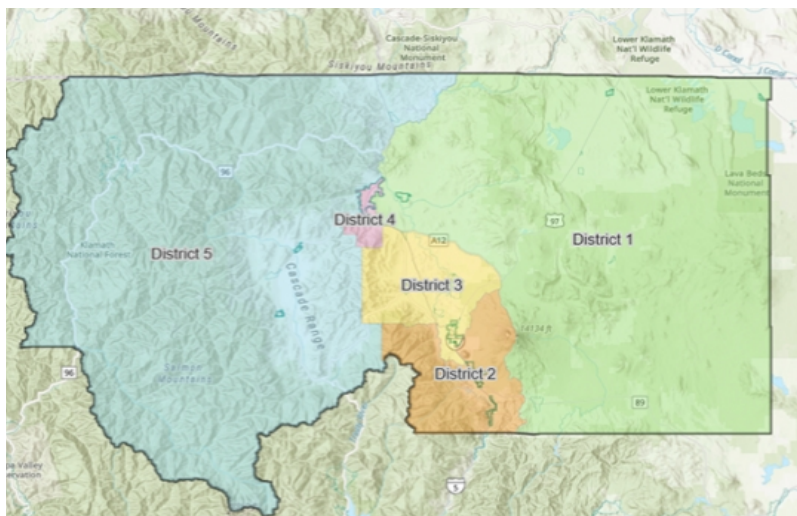
